POS 110/310: American Government & Politics / American National Government (F2011, Su2012, Sp2013, F2013, F2015, Sp2016, Sp2017, Sp2018, Sp2019) – Survey course introducing American politics. 110 is the freshman-level version and 310 is the upper-division version. I taught a fully online version of the course from 2011-2013; in-person version subsequently.

POS 191: First-Year Seminar: Political Thinking, Left and Right (3 sections each in F14, F15) – A 1-credit seminar focusing on contemporary American ideologies, political polarization, and the psychology of liberal/conservative differences, while an “academic success” element of the course helps orient new freshmen to university life and expectations.

POS 230: Current Issues in National Politics (Sp08, Sp09, F09) – Lower-division, writing-intensive, and discussion-oriented course focused around four contemporary controversies in American politics.

POS 325: Public Policy Development (F06, F07, F08, F09, Sp11, F12, F13, Sp15, Sp16, F16, F17) – Upper-division lecture and discussion course focused on (a) rival perspectives on the justifications for government action; and (b) the policy process, especially agenda-setting, implementation, and theories of policy change; illustrated by (c) an in-depth examination of one or two specific policy domains.

POS 394: Social Welfare and Health Policy (Sp17, Sp19) – Upper-division, discussion-oriented course with required research paper; examines the goals of, functioning of, and debates surrounding major U.S. social policies, in historical and comparative perspective.

POS 410: Governing American Cities (F05, F06, F07, Sp10, Sp13, Sp14, F16, Sp18) – Upper-division lecture and discussion course examining issues of political power in urban areas, institutional arrangements of local and metropolitan governance, and policy responses to urban poverty and decline.

POS 498: Metropolitan Growth: Politics and Policy (Sp06, F08, Sp11) – Senior-level, writing-intensive seminar exploring the interplay between public policy and metropolitan growth, with attention to the interrelated issues of suburban sprawl, local economic development, open space preservation, growth management, and transportation alternatives.

POS 570: The Politics of Public Policy (Sp09, F10, F11, F14, F17) – Graduate field seminar analyzing how politics shapes public policy and vice versa, with attention to major theoretical approaches such as punctuated equilibrium, subsystem frameworks, historical institutionalism, and policy feedback.

POS 598/PAF 591: Urban Politics & Policy (Sp07, F12) – Graduate seminar focusing on theories of power, institutional development, policymaking, and political behavior in U.S. metropolitan areas, with particular attention to the politics of urban development and racial/ethnic change.
